When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons." Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the

LORD's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel." And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed — and a sword will pierce your own soul too." There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.



CANDLEMAS: Today we observe a feast which has many names: *The Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary; The Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple;* and *Candlemas*. The first two refer to

events recounted in today's Gospel reading. The last refers to a ceremony, peculiar to the day, which has been part of the practice of the Church since the seventh century. At the Masses candles are blessed then carried in procession to commemorate the entry of Christ, the Light of the World, into the Temple at Jerusalem. Jesus came, as the prophet Simeon said, in the words of the *Nunc Dimittis* which the choir will sing during the lighting of the candles, "to be a light to lighten the Gentiles, and to be the glory of thy people Israel."

Also, in honor of Saint Blaise Day (Feb. 3), we have the Blessing of Throats immediately following each Mass. Saint Blaise is a fourth-century saint to whom is attributed many miracles of healing. While being taken to prison and eventual martyrdom, he healed a boy who was choking on a fishbone. It has become the tradition for throats to be blessed on this day to maintain health from diseases affecting the voice and heal injuries and cure diseases of the throat. Those wishing to receive The Blessing of Throats are asked to kneel at the Lady Chapel Altar rail immediately after the Masses.

The celebration of Candlemas will continue this afternoon at 3:00pm, when our sister parish, All Saints', Ashmont, will offer Solemn Evensong, Solemn Procession, and Solemn Benediction for the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord. The combined choirs of All Saints', Ashmont, and All Saints', Worcester, will sing the service, Fr Thompson will be the guest preacher, and Andrew Scanlon will be playing the organ. Parishioners of the Advent are cordially invited to attend.


ENTR'ACTE. Robin Landrith begins a three-part reading of Genesis 1–2:4a as a source for discerning the work of the Holy Spirit in the church.
